A Brief History of the Boardwalk: South Jersey's Iconic Shore Strolls

When you think of the Jersey Shore, the boardwalk is as much a part of the experience as the beach itself. With the scent of salt air, the glow of neon lights, and the rhythm of waves beneath, South Jersey's iconic boardwalks have offered generations of visitors a place to stroll, snack, and soak up summer. From grand hotels to neon-lit rides, these walkways are where shore memories are made.

Atlantic City: The Original Shore Stroll - The Atlantic City Boardwalk holds the distinction of being the world's first boardwalk, built in 1870. Designed initially as a practical solution to keep sand out of hotels and train cars, the wooden walkway quickly became the heart of AC's tourism industry. By the early 1900s, it was lined with grand hotels, theaters, and amusement piers. The legendary Steel Pier, opened in 1898, became famous for hosting diving horses, big band performances, and early movie screenings.

Did You Know? The first section of Atlantic City's boardwalk was only eight feet wide and one mile long!

Today, the Atlantic City Boardwalk stretches about 5.5 miles and blends historic charm with modern casinos, shops, and restaurants. It remains a must-see attraction where you can literally walk in the footsteps of history.



Ocean City: Family-Friendly Tradition - Ocean City's boardwalk began in 1880, just a decade after Atlantic City's, reflecting the town's early commitment to providing clean, wholesome fun. After storms and fires destroyed early versions, the resilient community rebuilt each time. The 1927 rebuild set the stage for today's boardwalk, which stretches about 2.5 miles and is packed with family-friendly amusements, bike rentals, mini golf, and classic food stands.

Did You Know? Ocean City's boardwalk is home to some of the oldest continuously operating amusement rides in New Jersey.

Wildwood: Doo-Wop Meets the Boards - Wildwood's boardwalk dates to 1900, but its heyday arrived in the 1950s and '60s, when the town became synonymous with Doo-Wop culture. Neon signs, motels with space-age themes, and the pulse of rock-and-roll gave the boardwalk its distinct character. Today, its two-mile stretch is home to giant amusement piers, waterparks, arcades, and some of the largest Ferris wheels on the East Coast.

Did You Know? Wildwood's boardwalk once hosted early performances. by rock legends like Bill Haley and Chubby Checker.

A Walk Through Time - From Atlantic City's pioneering planks to Wildwood's bright lights and Ocean City's family-friendly charm, South Jersey's boardwalks remain timeless symbols of summer. Whether you're chasing arcade tickets, savoring funnel cake, or breathing in that salty breeze, a stroll on these historic boards connects you to over a century of shore tradition.

This Saturday, June 28, Margate thrills to the pulsating rhythm of Beachstock 2025: The Planet's Biggest Beach Party, a sun-to-sunset celebration that blends local charm with all-out beach fun.

Along the sand between Huntington and Granville Avenues, the community gathers—not for a show, but for an all-day experience that's as lighthearted as it is lively. This free event removes the splash of beach tags and invites more than 5,000 attendees yearly to explore dozens of food trucks (from local classics like Cali Shakes, Tacocat, and South Jersey Smoke House, to newcomers like DonutNV and Philly Pretzel Factory), browse artisan crafters, and sample cold beverages under the sun.

Live entertainment takes center stage beginning at 11:30am, with acts ranging from alternative rock by Sunrise Cries, to Latin surf sounds from Mas Tequila Orchestra, to family-friendly feats from The Hook. South Pacific Island Dancers offer cultural flair, country singer Nikki Briar hits around sunset, and the NJ British Invasion wraps up the night with Beatles, Stones, and Who classics. A sunset screening of Moana 2 for kids—followed by a bonfire—cements Beachstock's reputation as a true family-friendly evening.

Beachstock is more than entertainment—it's participatory, community-minded fun. Free surfing lessons from Stacey's Surf Camp, cornhole, volleyball, kite demos by Air Circus, and a home-run derby from AC Volleyball Factory keep the pace energetic. Younger guests can enjoy a dedicated Kids Stage with hula hoop sessions, eco-themed treasure hunts, Wawa freebies, and crafts. Sustainable Downbeach takes its role seriously, too—staffed tents and environmental exhibits highlight the region's coastal stewardship efforts.

Other highlights include meet-and-greets with the newly crowned Miss New Jersey and the Philadelphia Eagles' Super Bowl LII Lombardi Trophy. Plus, a waterfront Tiki Bar adds that breezy, weekend-away feeling.

Margate's Beachstock Returns: Sunday Funday on the Shore

Parking is made easy with a complimentary lot at Eugene A. Tighe Middle School and a free jitney running along Atlantic Avenue. Beachstock rolls on from 8am to 10pm with a rain date of June 29, promising a full day of sun, sound, and community.

What Makes It Special - Beachstock isn't just a fest—it's Margate's annual reminder of why summer works at the Shore. It's vibrant without being overwhelming; spontaneous but well-organized; rooted in local pride and wide open to newcomers. It's this blend—live-stage excitement, seaside calm, childlike joy, craft sips, and the casual chance to stand at the edge of a bonfire under the stars—that makes Beachstock feel less like an event and more like a Shore tradition in motion.

What's Next After Beachstock - Even as the embers fade, Margate's summer calendar continues to gain momentum. Thursday mornings bring open-air farmers' markets along S. New York Avenue, where local produce, prepared foods, baked goods, and artisan craft standouts are always in season. Ongoing options include surf lessons on calm-weather mornings, sunset strolls to Lucy the Elephant, and casual boating or crabbing outings along the bayfront.

Beachstock delivers one day of unapologetic joy-food, activity, art, and coast. But in

Margate, the summer doesn't begin and end with one event. It's a season marked by moments: the first surf, the first lemon shake-up, the first bonfire. And if this Saturday is any indication, the Shore is open for everything between the sand and stars.

YOGA POSE OF THE WEEK -Seated Wide Angle Straddle (Upavistha Konasana)

Opening your legs wide creates a slightly different stretch from Paschimottanasana. To do this yoga pose: Separate your legs into a wide position. Flex both feet and engage both legs on the floor, coming into Upavistha Konasana. Forward bend to the center, extending your spine on inhale and deepening the yoga pose on exhale. Though it may look like the mandate is to bring your chest to the floor, it's not about that. Instead, keep your back flat, rotate your pelvis forward instead of crunching through your spine, and keep your feet flexed. If you do all three of these things, it doesn't matter how far forward you lean.



VITAMIN HIGHLIGHT -Vitamin B1

The most important element is the sauce, with hot sauce bringing out that heat and sweet sauces being full of flavor. They are even served with celery, carrots, or other crunchy veggies to provide a balanced taste palate.

Chicken wings have gained exponential popularity with chicken wing festivals mushrooming almost everywhere. The National Buffalo Wing Festival remains the most famous event. Several years after the inception of these chicken wings, McDonald's, followed by KFC and Domino's Pizza, introduced their own hot wings.

Now Chicken Wings are not just eaten in the U.S. but in all parts of the world such as Canada, India, Mexico, Germany, Singapore, the United Kingdom, and many more. Who wouldn't want an entire day dedicated to this dish that makes us salivate as soon we hear the name!



Riding Waves of Inclusion: Heart of Surfing's Surf Day Returns to Ocean City



This Saturday, June 28, the Atlantic County coast transforms into a place of opportunity and empowerment as Heart of Surfing hosts its annual Surf Day at Ocean City's 57th Street Beach. From 9 a.m. to noon, the nonprofit invites families—especially those with children on the autism spectrum or with developmental differences—to experience the joy of riding waves in a supportive, accessible environment.

Now in its seventh summer, Surf Day is part of Heart of Surfing's mission to make the ocean a shared playground. Participants benefit from foam boards, volunteer instructors, and a community that understands the power of the water—not just for sport, but for connection. There's no fee to join, and registration ensures surf-ready athletes arrive with everything needed to paddle out and ride in.

Ocean City's 57th Street Beach, with its calm surf and long, open shoreline, offers the ideal setting. Local supporters, including family volunteers, guide surfers into the water, helping with paddling, balance, and standing up on the board. The result is unfiltered joy—the kind only found when the ocean meets access.

Organizers point to Surf Day as more than momentary fun. It's a reminder of how inclusion changes lives: participants build self-confidence, families forge connections, and volunteers walk away with a sense of purpose—and salt in their hair.

If you miss this Saturday's session, Heart of Surfing returns to local beaches throughout the summer—don't hesitate to check their website for updated dates and locations. Surf Day also complements International Surfing Day celebrations, turning casual beach outings into intentional acts of inclusion and joy.

Fishing in Atlantic County

Any angler 16 and older must have a valid license to fish the fresh waters of New Jersey. This includes privately owned lakes and other waters. For more information visit the NJ DEP Division of Fish and Wildlife Fishing License Information website at dep.nj.gov/njf-w/fishing/freshwater/buy-a-license/. Remember that all saltwater anglers 16 and older must register with the state. Go to NJ Saltwater Recreational Registry Program for registration information at dep.nj.gov/saltwaterregistry/.

SALTWATER FISHING

Atlantic City - Gardner's Basin Marina, North New Hampshire Avenue and the bay, is home to charter boats, sightseeing and fishing cruises. For more information call (609) 348-2880. Fishing is permitted on the beaches, outside of guarded areas, and from the jetties. The seawall along Sunset Avenue is a popular area for crabbing or fishing from land in the back bay. A municipal boat launch (fee required) is located at Albany Avenue and Boulevard Avenue.



Ventnor/Ventnor Heights - The Ventnor City Fishing Pier is located at Cornwall Avenue and the Boardwalk. The fishing pier offers seasonal rates for fishing or sightseeing. For additional information, call the piermaster at (609) 823-7944. Along the back bay, a seawall the length of Winchester Avenue is perfect for the family to fish or crab from land. A free boat ramp is located on the bay on Dorset Avenue, where there is plenty of free parking. For more information call (609) 823-7900.

Margate - Amherst Avenue, between Decatur and Monroe avenues, is home to several marinas and bait and tackle shops, including small boat rentals. Within the marinas are dozens of charter boats available on a daily basis throughout the summer and shoulder seasons. For more information on charters call Capt. Andy's at (609) 822-0916, or for a family outing on a pontoon rental boat call Ray Scott's Dock at (609) 822-6819. Surf fishing is permitted during non-guarded hours.

Somers Point - John F. Kennedy Park, located on Broadway, offers a boat ramp (fee required) granting access to Great Egg Harbor Bay. Another ramp (fee required) is located at Smith's Marina, 910 Bay Ave. Along the Bay Front Historic District on Bay Avenue there are several marinas which are home to many party and charter boats. There is also a crabbing and fishing pier located on the bay off New Jersey Avenue. Restrooms are located nearby.

Brigantine - Surf fishing is permitted on non-guarded beaches and at the seawall, Seventh Street north to 14th Street. The old Brigantine Bridge, across Absecon Inlet from Harrah's Marina, is used as a fishing pier. A public boat ramp (fee required) is located at Sixth and Bayshore avenues on the bay. For more information, call (609) 266-1122.

Leeds Point - Seasonal fishing and crabbing are permitted in designated areas of both the Brigantine and Barnegat Divisions of the Edwin B. Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge. These areas include saltwater fishing (from land) at the following locations: Gravelling Point, Little Beach (with permit), Parkertown Dock Road, Cedar Run Dock Road, and Stafford Avenue. Boats may be launched at the Brigantine Division's Scotts Landing boat ramp, located at the end of Scotts Landing Road, off Moss Mill Road at Leeds Point. Freshwater fishing is permitted on Lily Lake in Oceanville. For more information call (609) 652-1665.

FRESHWATER FISHING

Lake Lenape Park - Lake Lenape Park East and Lake Lenape Park West are located in Hamilton Township and together encompass nearly 2,000 acres of land. Each park offers a variety of activities and facilities for residents and visitors to enjoy with its own entrance and access points. Boating is allowed on the lake with proper permits as required. All boaters must comply with state regulations and laws. No personal watercraft are permitted. For information on obtaining a boating permit and the associated fees contact the Lake Lenape Park office at (609) 625-8219.

Lake Lenape Park East - 753 Park Road, Mays Landing. This park is located on the eastern side of Lake Lenape and offers the most scenic views of the lake. Recently completed renovations include a new fishing pier, pickle ball courts, additional pavilions, landscaping enhancements and ADA accessibility improvements. The refurbished catering hall, Lakeside Manor, is a unique and picturesque lakefront venue that is available for special events and weddings for more than 250 guests. Lake Lenape Amenities: Fishing, Softball, Pickle Ball, Playground, Picnic Tables, Pavilions, Catering Hall, Historic Lighthouse, Restrooms, Convenient Parking.

Lake Lenape Park West - This park is located on the western side of Lake Lenape (note that some land on the eastern side and the entire lake surface is controlled by the county). The park entrance is located at 6303 Harding Highway in Mays Landing and encompasses nearly two-thousand acres of land, all the way up to the Black Horse Pike (Route 322). Things to Do at Lake Lenape West: Mountain Biking, Boathouse, Boating Access, Boat Ramp, Camping, Kayak/Canoe Access, Cross-county Skiing, Fishing, Gazebo (reservations required and may be made online or in person), Hiking, Unimproved Trails, Hunting, Nature Trails, Playground, Picnic Tables, Scenic Views, Playground. Inhale the Ocean: Salt Air and Breathwork at the Jersey Shore

It happens the moment you crest the bridge onto the island. The temperature dips just slightly, the breeze picks up, and the air changes — cool, salty, and alive with the scent of the sea. You roll down the window or step out of the car, and that first deep breath feels like a reset. The worries of the mainland slip away.

At the Jersey Shore, this ritual of arrival offers more than just nostalgia. The salt air, rich with sea minerals and natural negative ions, has long been linked to a sense of clarity, calm, and renewal. When paired with mindful breathwork, the ocean breeze can help quiet the mind, open the body, and reconnect you with the present moment.

Why Salt Air Feels So Healing - The rejuvenating power of salt air comes down to its unique mix of elements:

Sea Aerosols: The ocean's mist carries microscopic salt crystals, magnesium, calcium, potassium, and iodine — trace minerals essential for our bodies. When we breathe in this moist, mineral-rich air, it can help loosen mucus, soothe the respiratory tract, and promote easier breathing. That's one reason seaside air was historically prescribed for those with asthma, bronchitis, or other lung conditions.

✓ Negative lons: Moving water — waves crashing, tides flowing — releases negative ions into the air. These invisible molecules are believed to increase serotonin levels, reduce stress, and enhance mood. While the science is still developing, many people report a natural lift in energy and calm when surrounded by sea air.

Natural Humidity: The Shore's moist air helps keep nasal passages and lungs hydrated, making each breath feel smoother and more comfortable compared to drier inland air. Combined, these elements make the first breath of ocean air feel like a tonic — cooling, clearing, and restoring.

Simple Shore Breathwork to Try - Breathwork — the art of conscious breathing — lets you fully embrace the gifts of salt air.



Bridge-to-Beach Breath Practice:

- As you cross the bridge, inhale deeply through your nose, savoring the coolness of the salt breeze.
- Exhale slowly through your mouth, releasing the rush of getting there.
- On the beach, match your breath to the rhythm of the waves: inhale for 4 counts, hold for 2, exhale for 6. Let the ocean's pulse guide you.

A Natural Reset - You don't need a gadget or a guidebook. Just pause, breathe deeply, and let the salt air work its quiet magic. At the Shore, the ocean welcomes you with each breath — a gift as timeless as the tides.



WHO'S JUNO, AND WHY DOES SHE WALK SO MUCH?

You may have previously heard the term "Juno Walk" thrown out by guide dog handlers and Seeing Eye instructors, but do you know what the term means?


Part of the science behind the matching process requires our Seeing Eye instructors to be able to understand how fast a potential Seeing Eye student walks and how much of a pull from the harness they need. To do this, instructors will do a "Juno Walk" with the student, acting as the dog and leading the student with a shortened harness handle for a short walk. The instructor will work with the student to determine how fast or slow they want to walk and how much pull they feel comfortable with.

All this information is incredibly helpful for our instructors when deciphering which dog would work best for each student!





Summer has officially arrived, and there's a delicious energy pulsing through markets across Atlantic County right now. From Ventnor's Friday morning market to Linwood and Somers Point's Saturday favorites, this is the moment when Jersey Fresh produce shines brightest. Here's what's looking spectacular this week:

- ~ Blueberries are in full swing. Hammonton—the renowned "Blueberry Capital of the World"—is turning out plump, deep-blue berries ready for picking and snacking.
- ~ Strawberries are still sweet and abundant—a seasonal treat at every market stand.
- ~ Tomatoes and corn are making fresh summer waves: juicy, low-acid tomatoes and early sweet corn are hitting just the right note.
- ~ Herbs like basil and mint are flourishing, begging to be plucked from bundles and sprinkled into dishes.

To celebrate the moment, here are two fresh recipes you likely haven't seen yet—designed to let these summer stars shine.

Blueberry-Basil Cheesecake Parfaits

A refined twist on classic summer flavors—perfect for dessert or brunch. **Ingredients:**

- 2 cups fresh blueberries, plus extra for garnish 3 Tbsp honey, divided
- 1 Tbsp fresh lemon juice ½ cup crushed graham crackers
- 1 tsp melted butter
- 8 oz cream cheese, softened
- ¼ cup Greek yogurt
- 2 Tbsp chopped fresh basil, plus leaves for garnish
- Pinch of salt

Instructions: Toss blueberries with 1 Tbsp honey and lemon juice; let macerate 10 minutes. Mix crackers, butter, and a pinch of salt; press into the bottom of four parfait glasses. Blend cream cheese, yogurt, basil, and remaining honey until smooth. Layer basil-cheese mixture over crumbs, followed by blueberries. Garnish with fresh basil and serve chilled.

Why it shines: Juicy blueberries pair with herbal basil in a creamy parfait—elevating a simple fruit treat into something elegant and unexpected.

Charred Corn & Heirloom Tomato Gazpacho

A seasonal soup that's no-cook (mostly) but full of charred flavor. **Ingredients:**

- 2 ears fresh sweet corn, kernels cut off 2 cups heirloom tomatoes, roughly chopped
- ½ cucumber, peeled and diced ¼ red onion, minced
- 1 clove garlic, minced 2 Tbsp chopped fresh basil, plus whole leaves
- 3 Tbsp olive oil 1 Tbsp sherry vinegar

Instructions: Grill corn kernels in a dry pan until lightly charred; cool. In a bowl, combine tomatoes, cucumber, onion, garlic, basil, grilled corn, olive oil, and vinegar. Season, chill 1 hour, then serve in bowls, garnished with basil leaves and a drizzle of olive oil.

Why it works: Charred corn adds a smoky crunch; paired with juicy heirlooms and crisp cucumbers, the result is a summer soup that's fresh, fun, and unforgettable.

Tips for a Stylish Market Visit

- ~ Arrive early for top-tier blueberries and heirloom tomato varieties
- \sim Buy in quantity—blanch and freeze extras for winter baking or quick smoothies.
- ~ Bring a basket—the markets are social hubs, and a little more produce might just walk into your hands.
